## knitting ring-Loop scarf idea

**Instructions No. 2930** 

Difficulty: Beginner

Working time: 7 Hours

Want a cosy and warm loop scarf, even if you can't knit with two needles? No problem - with a knitting ring and these instructions you can certainly knit your first own loop.



Knitting with a knitting ring works best with wool for which a needle size of 7.0 to 12.0 is recommended.

Tie the beginning of the wool yarn to the knob on the outside of the knitting ring (end pin).

Wrap each pin once from the inside to the outside and repeat this for a second round so that there are two loops on each pin. Now lift the bottom stitch of each peg over the top stitch (knit) until the round is complete.

Then wrap the wool around each peg again and knit the new round. Continue in this way until your knitted piece has reached the desired length.

To complete the loop, you must now fasten off all the stitches:

Wrap the yarn once around the first peg and lift the bottom stitch over the newly created stitch. Repeat this for the second peg.

Then fasten off the first stitch by lifting it over the peg of the second stitch. Wrap the wool yarn around this peg, again lifting the lower stitch over the upper stitch.

Now move the remaining stitch one peg further to the left so that you now have one stitch less on the embroidery ring. The two stitches to the left of this gap now form another pair to bind off: Wrap the wool yarn around the left peg, lift the bottom stitch over the top stitch and then the newly knitted stitch over the right peg. Again, knit both stitches together, wrap a safety loop, lift the bottom stitch back over the top stitch and move this last stitch worked one peg to the left.

Continue in this way until you have bound off all the stitches in the embroidery ring.

Detach the last loop from the peg and pull the thread through. Sew the end thread with the needle.
